Using the Library

The print resources are classified with the Library of Congress Classification system. This is an alphanumeric system running from A-Z with each letter of the alphabet signifying a different subject matter. Multiple letters indicate different subtopics in a field. The system is used in most academic libraries.



II (A) (7) A learning resource system includes all materials that support a student's aducational experience and enhance a school's aducational program such as libraries; texts; electronic resources; learning resource laboratories and centers; library consortia and interlibrary loan agreements; computers; internet access; research databases; and other similar resources and equipment. The learning resource system can be centralized or decentralized in organization but resources must be easily and readily accessible to students and faculty during and beyond classroom hours, regardless of location or means of delivery. II (A) (7) (a) A school's learning resource system must include materials commensurate with the level of education provided and appropriate to the course of study in sufficient quantity and scope to meet the educational objectives of each program and include such elements as: relevant and current texts and periodicals; research journals and databases; standard works of reference; multi-media and/or electronic resources; electronic library resource technologies; and other resource materials necessary to adequately serve the student body. II (C) (4) (a) (i) The institution's curricular offerings must be consistent with the goals, objectives, and mission of the institution. Borrowing and Returning Procedures

The library collection is for the use of the Washington University of Science and Technology community.

Anyone wishing to check out materials should contact the library with the title and author of the book. They will be expected to fill out a checkout sheet with their name and contact information

Books have a 2-week lending period. Please contact the librarian to extend or renew check-out times for all resources. *Renewals are allowed at the discretion of the Librarian*. Any damage to the books will be billed to the user's account. Lost materials will generate overdue fines, a replacement fee, and administrative costs for the borrower. An account will be locked, and books recalled if fines are not paid.

Fairfax County Public Libraries

If you are a resident of Washington, D.C. you can register for library cards in Montgomery County and Prince George's County Maryland. Virginia county locations include Fairfax, Loudon, Arlington, Prince William County, Fall Church, Alexandria, and Frederick.

Public libraries have a wide variety of resources and databases you can access using your free library card in person and online. Some of their offerings include newspapers, music, movies, genealogy, job assistance, language software, book clubs, and community classes.

Local Academic Libraries

Academic libraries are more restricted as their primary patrons will be their students, staff, and faculty, but some offer visitor privileges. Remember to check their websites for any updates and changes in rules and regulations as these are subject to change.

The Library of Congress

The Library of Congress requires a reader registration or ID card to access research areas of the library. It is free and available to all. One must apply in person with documentation, although you can pre-register online. Once you are a reader you may borrow materials, and use reading rooms and computer terminals.
